

Shai Franklin

Veteran Jewish community executive in the United States and internationally, advocacy trainer, frequent lecturer and commentator on TV and radio, online, and in print.

Shai Franklin is Partner and Director of National Government Relations at Gotham Government Relations, a versatile firm with strong ties to business and government leaders in New York, Washington, and globally. He serves as Adjunct Professor in Long Island University's Hutton House Lectures and as Bonhoeffer Fellow at Boston-based Hebrew College's Miller Center for Interreligious Learning.

Previously, Shai was instrumental in forging the 2004 Berlin Declaration by 57 governments across Europe and North America to combat antisemitism, organizing the April 2002 National Israel Solidarity Rally, systematizing Jewish participation in the Organization of American States (OAS), securing tens of millions of dollars in new reimbursements for New York Jewish day schools, admitting Israel's Magen David Adom into the International Red Cross, coordinating the first distribution of U.S. Government food assistance in post-Soviet Russia, and upholding Interpol "Red Notices" against the Iranian perpetrators of the 1994 AMIA bombing in Buenos Aires.

Shai is former Executive Director of the World Jewish Congress, where he also served as Treasurer of the Conference of NGOs in Consultative Status with the UN. He has worked with the American Council for World Jewry, Anti-Defamation League, and NCSEJ (formerly National Conference on Soviet Jewry). He has been a Fellow with The Washington Institute for Near East Policy, Jerusalem Center for Public Affairs, UN Watch and American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, and a Wexner Graduate Fellow at UCLA. His clients have included American Jewish Committee, American Jewish Congress, Institute for Gulf Affairs, Israel Policy Forum, Libya's Government of National Accord and Libyan Investment Authority, Republika Srpska, Ruderman Family Foundation, Ukrainian Jewish Committee, Ukraine's Ministry of Education, and Kharkiv's Regional State Administration. He was founding Executive Chairman of the Kosovo-Israel Chamber of Commerce.

Shai has testified in the U.S. Congress and addressed numerous international meetings of the UN, Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe and the Inter-Parliamentary Conference on Human Rights and Religious Freedom, and was a plenary speaker at the International Economic Forum in Kharkiv, Ukraine. Under the auspices of the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs, he has conducted research in France on Islamic-Jewish relations. In response to Shai's advocacy for Ukraine, in 2022 the Russian Foreign Ministry officially banned him from entering Russia.

Shai has appeared as an expert on TV networks as diverse as Shalom TV, i24, Al Jazeera, Turkey's TRT World, and Argentina's C5N. He frequently publishes analysis nationally and internationally.

Shai earned a B.A. in political science (summa cum laude) from Temple University, where he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He holds an M.A. from the Johns Hopkins University's Nitze School of Advanced International Studies, where he was selected for the U.S. Government's elite Presidential Management Intern Program. Shai was founding editor of Brown Middle East Journal, and the key student organizer for AIPAC and Soviet Jewry advocacy on the campuses of Rhode Island School of Design, Brown University, and Temple.

Now based in New York, Shai has worked and traveled widely across Eastern and Western Europe, the former Soviet Union, Latin America, the Middle East, and South Asia.
